

## Name That Plant — Answers

1	Вох	Box – (Buxus sempervirens) plants can be decimated by an insect, new to Britain, called the Box Catepillar. Box plants are favourites for topiary, where plants are trimmed into shapes.
2	Broom	Broom – (Cystius scoparius), grows in the wild, as well as the various, colourful, cultivated varieties.
3	Birdsfoot Trefoil	Birdsfoot Trefoil – (Lotus corniculatus), is a ground loving, wild plant. The flowers sometimes have an orange hue.
4	Buttercup	Buttercup – ( Ranunculus), there are many types in the wild plant, buttercup family.
5	Bedstraw	Bedstraw – (Rubia ceae), there are many types in the wild, Bedstraw family.
6	Bluebell	Bluebell – (Endymion non- scriptus), wild, native, Bluebells (& white variety) can be found in many locations. The Imported, Spanish garden, variety are now wild too!

7	Buckthorn		Buckthorn – (Rhamnus catharticus), is a small bush/tree with thorns as well as orange berries and glaucous leaves.
8	Bulrush		Bulrush – (Reed Rush/Typha latifolia), is part of the sedge family. The tall leaves and fronds show where water lies beneath.
9	Foxglove		Foxglove – (Digitalis purpurea), comes in a variety of pink to white. There is also a yellow variety.
10	Water–Lily		Water-lily – (Nymphaeaceae), the white and yellow water- lilies are native to the U.K. The more colourful varieties are cultivated ones.
11	Crab Apple		Crab Apple – (Malus sylvestris), is a spiny, small tree bearing pink or white flowers and red/orange/yellow fruit.
12	Harebell	Paul Starry 1997 - The Wild Flowers of Brita	Harebell – (Campanula rotundifolia), has a dainty stem and flower. Harebells live in dry grasslands and heaths.
