There are 200, isles, islands, aits, or eyots in the river Thames. As time, tides, flooding and water courses changes, the number of isles alter in size as well as new ones appear and others disappear. For example, Kingston Upon Thames was an island once as well as being the first place for crossing the river Thames, moving westward, during Anglo-Saxon times. As locks were installed, new islands were often made in the process and as new water course have developed naturally or by design, islands come and go. Some of the islands are inhabited, some have historical connections.
