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About Fulham Palace

Fulham Palace is the historic home of the Bishops of London. For centuries, the Palace and surrounding estate served as a country retreat for the Bishops and their families before becoming the Bishop's permanent residence in the early 20^{th} century. The last Bishop moved out in 1973, and the Palace and 13 acre botanical garden are now managed by Fulham Palace Trust, an independent charity dedicated to engaging people and providing an insight, through the stories of the Bishops of London, into over 1,300 years of English history and to become one of Great Britain's most loved and inspiring historic houses and gardens.

How to get there

Main entrance: the end of Bishop's Avenue by gates to Bishop's Park

Bus: 14, 74, 220, 414, 430

Tube: Putney Bridge (from the station follow the Thames Path west along the river through Bishop's Park, midway through the park is the Bishop's Avenue gate, exit through gate and immediately right into Fulham Palace grounds)

Parking: metered parking on Bishops Avenue
